Pediatric nursing assistants, also known as pediatric nursing assistants, work with children in hospitals, pediatricians' offices, and community health posts. They help nurses, doctors and other medical professionals take care of children with serious illnesses and injuries. They also help patients in recovery from invasive surgical procedures. Pediatric nursing assistants monitor vital signs, make beds, and respond to a wide variety of patient requests. However, many undergo extensive background checks, interviews, and specialized training before they are hired. Pediatric nursing assistants clean, dress and feed patients. They pick up vital signs and report and record patients' conditions. They need to practice health care and insurance at all times and ensure that their patients are as comfortable as possible. Pediatric nursing assistants perform many of the same activities as colleagues from other specialties. However, because they take care of the children, these nurses must be extra careful to be patient, kind and understanding. Pediatric nursing assistants work in various health environments, including hospitals, specialized health centers, and medical clinics. They typically work in children's hospitals or pediatric wards of general and surgical hospitals. They can work part-time and full-time, day and night. Nursing assistants working in pediatricians' offices usually have more traditional weekly schedules than hospitals. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, nursing assistants in all specialties earned an average of \$12.22 per hour or \$25,420 per year in May 2011. The BLS expects the number of vacancies for pediatric nursing assistants, as well as assistants in other specialties, to grow 20% from 2010 to 2020. This is faster than the predicted 14% growth rate for all occupations. Geropsitits nurse managers supervise specialized units in the psychiatric care of elderly patients. They supervise nursing colleagues, assess the quality of care provided by the unit and respond to questions and concerns of patients and their families. They have advanced training in geriatric and psychiatric nursing, as well as previous administrative experience. Geropsychiatric refers to the mental, emotional and psychiatric care of elderly patients. Geropsychiatric units treat patients with a diverse set of mental health disorders, including age-related diseases such as Alzheimer's and dementia, and chronic diseases such as depression, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia and e- Abuse. Geropsied nurses evaluate patients, administer medications, and collaborate with physicians to develop treatment plans. They also provide counseling and education to patients and their families. The nurse managers who supervise these units provide direct care to the patient and act as administrators. Geropsychic nursing managers must have at least one associate or bachelor's degree in nursing, with many facilities preferring additional training in geriatric or geropsitric nursing. The University of Massachusetts Lowell, for example, offers a graduate certificate in geropsitric nursing and mental health for students with a bachelor's degree in nursing. Some geropsiaph nurses hold doctorates or work as specialists in clinical nursing or nurses. They should also obtain their registered nursing licenses upon approval of the NCLEX-RN exam, administered by the National Council of State Nursing Councils. Most have held previous administrative or supervisory roles, such as a nurse in charge or assistant manager of the unit. Nursing managers supervise the nursing team of the geropsitric unit, assigning them to specific patients and defining work schedules. They also assess employee performance and reward nurses who provide superior patient care, while reprimanding or taking other disciplinary action against those who violate ethical rules or guidelines or fail to perform their work functions. They also train nurses in their units, especially recent graduates or new ones in the unit. In addition, nursing managers create departmental budgets and ensure that the unit is well supplied with medicines and other supplies. Nursing managers assess the overall quality of patient care provided by geropsitric units. Established in 1997 as a high-quality health care and education center in southern Nevada, the Las Vegas Medical District houses many hospitals and acute care providers, including University Medical Center, Valley Hospital Medical Center, and the Cleveland Clinic Lou Ruvo Center for Brain Health.
